The distinction of being a part of this select group was special for the Mayor: "I was humbled to be part of the class of 2014 honorees; these are amazing people who enrich the lives of everyone around them."

In addition, Lois Bernstein, senior vice president at MultiCare Health System in Tacoma, received the 2014 Lifetime Achievement recognition, and the creator of local blog www.TacomaWorkingMom.com, Rosie Martinson, received the 2014 Rising Star Woman of Influence.

Women of Influence recognizes outstanding female leaders in the South Puget Sound. Honorees are selected for their achievement in community, business, government, military and/or nonprofit sectors. The panel of judges, comprised of previous years' honorees, may also name rising stars and a Military Award honoree, when applicable. Nominees/Applicants must work/reside in Pierce, Thurston or South King Counties. This year almost 30 individuals were nominated for these honors.

After months of war, 16th CAB aviation unit returns home

A smiling Spc. Kevin Salas held his daughter Alannah for the first time the night of Sept. 20 inside hangar 2158 on JBLM's Gray Army Airfield. "I just can't believe I'm here right now. It's amazing; she's amazing," said Salas. When Alannah was born, Salas was deployed to southern Afghanistan with the 16th Combat Aviation Brigade.

The Raptors were responsible for providing general aviation support for Operation Enduring Freedom. At 11 p.m. on Saturday, Sept. 20 that mission came to an end for more than 100 Raptor Soldiers. They marched into the hangar to the sound of cheers, applause and colorful banners welcoming them home.

"It's nice to see families out supporting, and [the unit] supporting. Soldiers coming home is special," said Jason Brier, brother-in-law to one of the returning soldiers, Spc. Matthew Shutter. "One-hundred and five soldiers went out and 105 heroes are coming home." Brier's daughter, Alexis Tenney, attended the homecoming to see her uncle. She's just seven years old, but she stood at the entrance of the hangar patiently waiting for Shutter to return.

"When he deployed, she was in first grade and it hit her pretty hard," said Brier. "He gave her his [patrol cap] and one of his dog tags with the promise that he would come home to get it." As promised, Tenney returned Shutter's patrol cap, and a big hug to go with it.

The homecoming ceremony is considered the first step for soldier and family reintegration. Salas, Shutter and the other returning soldiers will spend the next two weeks receiving resources to help them reintegrate, and medical evaluations to make sure their immediate needs are addressed.

The Army provides a number of resources to include behavioral health specialists and family advocates to assist soldiers and families in getting back to life as normal. Reintegration is a different experience for everyone, but to help, soldiers are provided a period of leave to allow time to reconnect with their loved ones. But first there is the homecoming.

Family members waited anxiously to greet their loved one inside hangar 2158. They were comforted by a video feed showing their soldiers exit the plane that carried them home from war.

"I love the live feed. They've really done a great job at keeping the families involved," said Brier.

More Raptors will return home in the coming weeks through a series of flights. Each will have their own stories, but they will all come home to the sounds of excitement.

An emotional Salas held his daughter as he recalled seeing her on Skype while deployed, "but this is way different," he said.

Curran Apple Orchard Tree Adoptions

Adopting an apple tree is a great way to start off 2015! The Curran Apple Orchard Park offers people opportunities to learn how to take care of apple trees...or just simply enjoy the harvest at the end of the season!

Two adoption categories are available:

***Pruning Adoptions (available December through March) - \$40**

Adopters are REQUIRED to prune, thin and remove wind-falls according to orchard maintenance policies listed on www.curranappleorchard.com. Free pruning classes are available along with trained volunteers to assist people in the orchard.

***Orchard Supporter (available all year) - \$65**

Supporters assist financially but may be unable to participate in tree maintenance.

Note: Current adopters have priority on readopting trees until Dec. 31. Open adoptions begin in January.



CORE (Curran Orchard Resource Enthusiasts) volunteer group is responsible for the adoption program along with other orchard activities. We are always looking for volunteers to assist with pruning, website, concerts, tours, cider squeeze and other tasks. 
FREE Face-Painting with Canned Food Donation

Safeguarding your community



How can you safeguard your neighborhood?

Many folks are not aware that MOST burglaries occur during the daytime. Burglars will often go door to door asking random questions like "Can you tell me how to get to Curtis Junior High School" or offer to clean gutters. It is important for neighbors to use good common sense and when they get that uneasy feeling about a person in their neighborhood, take the time to report it to authorities. If you feel that a speedy response will make a difference, dial 911. All other reports can go to the 24-hour non-emergency number: 253.798.4722.

In addition to reporting suspicious activity to authorities, neighbors

can also increase safety by informing one another of suspicious circumstances, keeping an eye on each other and working together to prevent crime. Neighbors can learn more about how to do this by hosting a neighborhood/police meeting.

Your University Place Police team is eager to help you gain a better understanding of crime in your neighborhood, crime in your city and how we can work together to continue to make University Place one of the safest and most livable communities around.

Do you own or live near a habitually noisy animal?

Pierce County Code 8.72.090 regulates Public Disturbance Noises. The code indicates that "it is unlawful for any person to cause, or for any person in possession of property to allow to originate from the property, a public disturbance noise."

Public disturbance noise is frequent, repetitive or continuous sounds made by an animal which unreasonably disturb or interfere with the peace, comfort and repose of property owners or possessors.

The key to the ordinance is "reasonable." What exactly is reasonable? Is it reasonable for a dog to bark all day or all night long? What about 10 minutes here and there all day long? What about for an hour here and there throughout the day?

If you feel you have a habitually noisy animal in your neighborhood, you should first consider talking to your neighbor. If you have tried to talk with your neighbor and the problem continues to occur, then you need to call Pierce County Animal Control at 253.798.7387 or visit our website at www.piercecountywa.org/pets to submit an online complaint.

If you are a dog owner or considering becoming a dog owner, please consider your neighbors when leaving your dog outdoors for extended periods of time, and especially in the evenings or late at night. No one wants to listen to a habitually noisy animal for extended periods of time.



Leave your old flame behind – upgrade to cleaner heat

Air quality in much of Pierce County does not meet federal standards for healthy air during colder fall and winter months, when many households rely on wood-burning devices for heating.

In addition to enhanced enforcement of burn bans in the Tacoma-Pierce County Smoke Reduction Zone, a new regulation requires old wood stoves that are not EPA certified be disposed of or rendered inoperable by Sept. 30, 2015. This law applies only in the Smoke Reduction Zone.

The Puget Sound Clean Air Agency is offering Zone residents incentives to get ahead of the new law.

- * Get up to \$350 to scrap your old wood stove OR
- * \$1,500 to upgrade to cleaner heat.
- * FREE heating upgrade for low-income households.
