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A City Worth Celebrating

Birthdays and anniversaries give us the opportunity to reflect and celebrate the year (or years) gone by and look ahead to a future full of opportunities and new horizons. And as University Place prepares to mark its 20th anniversary as an incorporated city, there is no doubt we truly have a lot to celebrate!

Although it would be difficult to find a cake large enough to share with the 31,720 residents of University Place, we hope that each and every citizen of this great city will take a few minutes to think about the successes we've achieved over the last two decades while also looking ahead to the many great things awaiting us in the years to come.

When you look at our city today, it might be hard to believe that 20 years ago the citizens of University Place did not have a governing body that could direct the development of their own community. We watched our city grow in ways that did not reflect our vision of a well-designed community that enhanced a healthy community lifestyle. But thanks to the tireless efforts of grassroots visionaries who recognized the need for citizens to have a voice in how their community would grow and evolve, our city was officially incorporated on Aug. 31, 1995.

At that time, University Place had no parks, sidewalks, streetlights or landscaping. There was no true center to the community, no unique identity around which citizens could foster a sense of community spirit and pride.

My how things have changed!

Only 20 years later, we have gone from being a "pass through" community to a city now known to the whole world for having hosted the golf world's premier event, the U.S. Open. Spectators and television viewers from around the world were treated to breathtaking views of our world-class golf course on the shores of Puget Sound.

The story of Chambers Bay's rebirth from a gravel pit to a stunning links-style course certainly impressed legions of golf fans, but citizens of U.P. should be equally impressed by the other noteworthy accomplishments our city has enjoyed since incorporation in 1995.

These include:

- Significant infrastructure improvements, including new sidewalks and streetlights; enhanced street aesthetics such as additional street trees, new banners and benches; and new and revitalized parks, trails and green spaces.
- The development of a new city center which has become an economic hub with both residential and retail uses. The quality design of this project has attracted national retailers as well as independent



business owners who want to be in "the heart of it all." This in turn has fueled new and renewed growth in other business centers around the city, growth that has helped us weather difficult economic times because of our growing tax base.

- The opening of a stunning new library and civic building that have created a true community center, fronted by a public plaza that is the perfect setting for annual celebrations such as Duck Daze and the Holiday Tree Lighting.
- The cultivation of a community ethos that recognizes how blue-ribbon education, senior citizen engagement, active volunteerism and enthusiastic support for the arts enhance our individual and collective quality of life.
- Top-notch public safety services that keep us safe and informed by employing cutting-edge technologies and training.
- Designation as a provisional regional growth center thanks to our opportunities for housing and employment growth. Sustainable housing values have inspired continued investment in our community, which is recognized as a great place to put down roots.
- Our comprehensive plan, developed and continually refined with input from our businesses and residents, has enabled us to leverage local, state and federal grants to improve our transit options and position us to be a major player in our region's growth.

In 20 short years, we've certainly experienced our fair share of growing pains. But thanks to the same kind of citizen engagement that "birthed" the City in 1995, University Place is no longer just a place to drive through. We are a verifiable destination, recognized as a great Place to live, educate, work, play, shop and age.


In addition, University Place in partnership with AUSA sponsored booths throughout the year at our community events allowing 16th CAB soldiers and their families to enjoy them with no charge in honor of their service to our country. University Place – What's the Plan?

Streets, houses, businesses, parks, schools ...all of these are components of nearly any city you visit. And yet each city has a unique flavor, a look and style that is all its own. What makes the difference? It's all in the vision, and a city's vision is brought to life through a document called a Comprehensive Plan. Each city is required to have one, and these plans lay out the guidelines and requirements for any development that happens within the city's borders. The Comprehensive Plan reflects the direction that a community will grow and the shape it will take.

The last time the City of University Place completed an in-depth review of its Comprehensive Plan was in 2004. Over the past 18 months, the City's Planning Commission has gone over every page of this rather sizable document for consistency, for relevance and accuracy. The Planning Commission has made a recommendation to the City Council that the extensive amendments made to the Comprehensive Plan be adopted. The City Council is now studying the proposed amendments to the Comprehensive Plan, and will make a decision soon.

Part of the process for adopting changes to the Comprehensive Plan is to give citizens an opportunity to express their opinions about the proposed changes. The venue for this discourse is a public hearing that will be held during a City Council meeting. Tentatively, the public hearing on the proposed changes to the Comprehensive Plan is scheduled for Monday, Sept. 21, 2015. The meeting will begin at 6:30 p.m. in the Town Hall meeting room at City Hall. If you plan to attend, be sure to check the calendar on the City's website (www.CityofUP.com) to confirm the public hearing date has not changed.

A Birthday Celebration at Sun Fest!

On Aug. 1, 2015 the City of University Place came together and celebrated its 20th year anniversary of incorporation at its annual Sun Fest celebration. The event was sponsored by Umpqua Bank, Click Cable TV!, Springfree Trampoline, Star Center, Whole Foods Market, U.P. Refuse & Recycling, and movie in the park sponsors were Click! The event featured more than 80 vendor booths, a kids' zone full of activities, the crowd-favorite watermelon eating contest and main stage performances from Ian Dobson, The High Rollers, and Beatles cover band Crème Tangerine. To top off a great day, families and friends gathered in the evening for a showing of Pixar's "Big Hero 6" and a firework display in Cirque Park.

The festival was full of laughter and fun as the community celebrated the City's past, present and promising future and joined in on a cupcake toast to 20 years of growth, innovation and community spirit.

Safe Routes to Schools – 44th Street and Elwood Drive

Soon it will be much safer to travel to school along 44th Street and Elwood Drive thanks to two Safe Routes to School projects. The City was able to secure more than \$1.6 million in federal grants to pay for these vital safety improvements.

44th Street (Bridgeport to 67th Ave)

Construction is well underway on the 44th Street Safe Routes to Schools project. Pedestrians will soon be able to enjoy new sidewalks along the north side of the street between Bridgeport and 67th Avenue. New energy efficient LED street lights will be installed to increase visibility on this busy corridor. Landscaping will also be installed where possible, to provide a buffer for pedestrians and to calm vehicle speeds. In addition, speed radar feedback signs will be installed to further reduce speeds and improve the safety for all users of the street. This project is scheduled to be complete later this fall.

Elwood Drive (Cirque to 40th St)/44th Street (Elwood to Sunset)

The safety of kids walking and biking to Narrows View and Curtis will be greatly improved with the upcoming Elwood/44th Street Safe Routes to School project. Under this project, new sidewalks, curbs, bikelanes and street lighting will be installed along the east side of Elwood Drive between Cirque Drive and 40th Street and along the south side of 44th Street between Elwood and Sunset Drive. Speed radar feedback signs will also be installed for speed control. This work is scheduled to begin this fall and be completed in the spring.

In honor of the 14th anniversary of September 11, West Pierce Fire & Rescue will hold a public ceremony in remembrance of the 2,977 victims killed on that date in 2001. Of those victims, 343 were firefighters, 60 were police officers and 55 were military personnel.

An evening ceremony will be held at 7 p.m. at the 9/11 Reflection Park at Station 31 in University Place, located at 3631 Drexler Drive West. Coffee and light refreshments will be served following the event. The public is encouraged to attend.

This ceremony is a small way for us to not only remember those 2,977 victims in New York City, at the Pentagon and in a meadow in Shanksville, Pennsylvania, but also to honor fire, police and military first responders who serve and protect our families, our communities and our nation, at home and abroad.

The City of University Place, in conjunction with University Place Refuse Service, Inc., is offering you an opportunity to dispose of and/or recycle some unwanted items and yard waste for free!

CLEAN-UP RULES:

- Limit 1 load per household for all items. **Except: Yard waste only – no limit!**
- Help us be good neighbors by securing and covering all loads!
- For safety reasons, children and pets must remain in vehicles.
- **City of University Place residents ONLY – photo I.D. will be required.**
- No liquids, paint or hazardous materials (car batteries OK).
- No loads larger than a regular pickup truck or equivalent small trailer will be allowed.
- No regular household garbage will be allowed.
- Residential only – no commercial material or loads will be allowed.
- The size of items can't exceed 5 feet in any direction (except appliances and furniture).
- No fuel tanks, enclosed barrels or drums of any kind. Water heaters and propane tanks are OK.

PLEASE SEPARATE ITEMS INTO THE FOLLOWING CATEGORIES FOR RECYCLING:

- **Wood:** clean unpainted lumber, pallets, etc.
- **Metal:** scrap steel, appliances, lawn mowers, barbeques, plumbing, etc.
- **Yard waste:** limbs, grass, leaves, other vegetation, no stumps or limbs larger than 4 inches in diameter, no dirt, rocks or sod.
NOT ACCEPTED: blackberries, Scotch broom and other noxious weeds.
- **Tires:** with or without rims.
- **Concrete, bricks and stone.**
- **Car batteries.**
- **Electronic waste recycling:** computers, monitors, printers, TVs, laptops, cell phones, cameras, etc.

Thanks for the Memories

Volunteers, Staff and Others share their U.S. Open Recollections

The satellite trucks are gone, the spectators have returned home and life has returned to normal in University Place. But for many U.P. residents who took temporary jobs, volunteered or spent years planning the U.S. Open at Chambers Bay, the memories of the tournament will linger forever.

A Temporary Position with Lasting Memories

More than 340 U.P. residents were hired to fill temporary security positions at the U.S. Open, exceeding the pre-event goal set by members of the University Place City Council. U.P. Mayor Pro Tem Javier Figueroa and City Council Member Steve Worthington asked Andy Frain Services, the firm that worked with the USGA to hire local support staff, to fast-track University Place citizens for the open positions.

“Our staff from U.P. and the surrounding areas has been one of our sharpest teams thus far,” said Sade Battle, national event manager for Andy Frain Services. That should come as no surprise given that the team included proud and dedicated U.P. stakeholders such as Chris Saunders, former Planning Commissioner; Peggy Rose Webster, a member of the City’s Economic Development Commission and a U.P. business owner; and Kimberly Halinen, whose husband owns Venti Productions, which produces community festivals such as Duck Daze and Sun Fest.

Julie Elliott is a U.P. resident who was hired for one of the temporary U.S. Open security positions as well. And she was lucky enough to pull one of the event’s premier assignments: the players’ locker room and players-only lunch room and hospitality suite.

Ensuring the players and their families could eat and relax in private was her primary responsibility. It was a great assignment, she said, noting that

in general, the media were the only people she felt could be rather aggressive in trying to catch the players’ attention. Although she was not to engage the players in any kind of conversation, she would say hello and welcome them to the private area. “Everyone was pleasant, kind and friendly,” Elliott said.

Sign Me UP!

More than 5,200 volunteers worked six-hour morning or afternoon shifts during the U.S. Open. One of them was Frank Elliott, Julie’s dad, who volunteered at the Admissions and Information tent.

For Frank, the memories of the U.S. Open are very personal. “I’m guessing not too many father-daughter teams worked the Open,” he said. “Although we provided entirely different services, we were able to share our daily experiences and to spend time together following our favorite players. As a 50-year resident of U.P. and an avid golfer for most of those years, it was an honor and pleasure to represent our community at the U.S. Open.”

Other volunteers included some of U.P.’s more “high profile” residents, including Mayor Denise McCluskey who worked in the Puget Sound Pavilion and City Council Member Ken Grassi, who worked in the Merchandise Tent. They were just a few of the many U.P. residents who volunteered.

Honoring Those Who Serve


Army Spc. Benjamin Rosa of the Army’s 16th Combat Aviation Brigade was invited to attend the U.S. Open at Chambers Bay as part of the Joint Base Lewis McChord Community Connector Program, which encourages neighboring communities to support soldiers and families from specific units at JBLM. Rosa serves with the 1-229th Attack Reconnaissance Battalion and was named the Army Aviation Association of America’s Crew Chief of the Year in 2014. He recently returned from a nine-month deployment to Kandahar Air Base in Afghanistan.

“We wanted to invite an outstanding soldier of merit from the 16th CAB, someone who would leave a positive impression on those who met him or her and someone who would appreciate the game of golf and have fun,” said University Place Mayor Denise McCluskey. “Spc. Rosa easily met all those criteria. He was not only an impressive man but polite and articulate as well. He certainly has the WOW factor.”

For Rosa, attending the U.S. Open for Sunday’s final dramatic play left him with a once-in-a-lifetime memory. “I absolutely loved it,” he said. “I would love to play there some day myself, even though I’m sure I’d do terrible.”

One for the History Books

Arne Handeland had media credentials for the U.S. Open at Chambers Bay, but he wasn't there to record how the players navigated the course, what clubs they chose or how they felt about the tee placements. He was there to capture the essence of the event and how it will be remembered in U.P.'s history. It was a natural assignment for Handeland, who authored "University Place" by Arcadia Publishing and who, by many, is considered the City's unofficial historian.



His observations as well as actual memorabilia from the event will eventually find their way to the University Place Historical Society's museum. "That was my goal," Handeland said. "I wanted to collect whatever I could. Everything from photos to the media guides the USGA provided."

Now that the chaos has subsided, Handeland says he is especially interested to see what hosting the Open will mean for the future of Chambers Bay and University Place. "I think the Open brought the eyes of the world to U.P.," he said. "I was pleased to hear the Fox broadcasters call it 'Chambers Bay in University Place.' I think that really created an identity for us."

Planned to a Tee

Bringing more than 230,000 people into a community of less than nine square miles could have been a recipe for disaster. But thanks to years of careful planning and preparation, the U.S. Open came off without a hitch. "Everything worked out absolutely perfectly," says Jennifer Hales, public safety administrator for the City of University Place Police Department. "A lot of credit goes to the USGA because they really had a plan for everything. And it all worked."

Hales also credits the residents of University Place, who truly rose to the occasion and paid attention to all the efforts to keep them informed and prepared. "I think most people were mentally ready and had a plan for themselves," Hales says.

"In the beginning they may have had to get an earlier start to get a sense of how long it was going to take to get around, but I think they were pleasantly surprised. The feedback we got from residents was that the traffic plan really worked."

During the weeks leading up to the event and the tournament itself, University Place residents and business owners demonstrated remarkable patience and a warm hospitality that impressed visitors, volunteers, the media, USGA players and officials alike. From those who took the time to sweep their sidewalks (and those of their neighbors), to those who pleasantly answered questions and offered local insights, we say "thank you." 



Arsenic and Lead in Pierce County



For almost 100 years, arsenic and lead were blown from a smoke stack throughout Pierce and King Counties from the ASARCO copper smelter in Ruston. The smelter closed in 1986. Even though the smelter is no longer operating, the arsenic and lead remain in the soil and will continue to be a health risk

for years to come.

The Tacoma-Pierce County Health Department's Environmental Health Division works diligently to provide education resources to communities like University Place who are among those most affected. What healthy actions can you take?

Kick Off Your Shoes – Dust and dirt are tracked inside on shoes.

Use Plenty of Soap and Water – Dirt is found on hands, toys, shoes, clothing and pets. Washing dirt off is a healthy thing to do.

Keep Pets Clean – Pets walk, roll and lie down in dirt and soil. When pets come into the house, their fur and paws bring in soil and dust, too.

Mop, Dust and Vacuum – People and pets track in dirt or it can enter your home in the form of small dust particles through windows and doors.



West Pierce Fire & Rescue Reminds Residents to Test Their Smoke Alarms



It's time for Fire Prevention Week, and from Oct. 4-10 West Pierce Fire & Rescue is joining forces with the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) to remind local residents to be sure they have working smoke alarms and test them regularly.

During this year's fire safety campaign, West Pierce will be spreading the word about the importance of having working smoke alarms installed in their homes. Smoke alarms should be installed in and outside of each bedroom, as well as on each level of the home.

"Smoke alarms are the first thing to alert residents there is smoke in the home and consistently saves lives. We are dedicated to helping our citizens and keeping them safe by offering free smoke alarm installations to residents in Lakewood and University Place," said Fire Chief Jim Sharp.

This program is made possible through grant funding and installations are done by appointment by West Pierce Fire & Rescue personnel. These smoke alarms have a 10-year battery and will not need to be changed annually like a typical 9-volt. All smoke alarms should be tested monthly to ensure they are working properly.

Appointments can be made based on the following criteria:

If your smoke alarms are more than 10 years old. However, if your home has smoke alarms that are hard-wired into your electrical system, we cannot replace them, as the protection you have is greater than the battery-powered alarms can offer.

If you do not have alarms inside and outside each sleeping area. We recommend a smoke alarm is in each sleeping area, as well as in the hallway outside. If you do not have alarms in both places, we can add alarms where they are needed.

If your smoke alarms are not working properly. We can replace battery-operated alarms that are not currently working properly. However, if you have hard-wired alarms, we cannot replace those with a battery-operated alarm.

If you are not sure what kind of smoke alarms you currently have. Please call us to make an appointment and we can assess your current alarms. We will then replace or add any alarms we can for you.

- 1. Get informed.** Learn what steps to take before, during and after a disaster.

- 3. Assemble an emergency kit.** Kits should have enough supplies for 5-7 days for you and your family.
