Phase 2 of the Safe Start Plan

Effective June 5, Pierce County moved into Phase 2 of Governor Inslee's Safe Start Recovery Program. This means restaurants, fitness facilities, hair and nail salons in University Place can reopen under certain precautions.

Although this second stage relaxes some of the previous restrictions enacted to slow the spread of the COVID-19 virus, Jennifer Hales, emergency operations coordinator and public safety administrator for the City of University Place, urges the public to continue to follow the Tacoma-Pierce County Health Department's recommendations. These include:

- Wearing face coverings in public settings when it is difficult to maintain six feet of physical distance from others.
- Washing hands frequently with soap and water for at least 20 seconds.
- Limiting social interactions to five friends or non-household members you want to see regularly.
- Continuing to stay home as much as possible and limiting non-essential travel.
- Disinfecting doorknobs, counters, toilet handles and other frequently touched surfaces regularly.
- Those who are 65 years or older, with medical conditions, or who are immune compromised, should check with their health care providers regarding social interactions with those outside their household.

A successful Safe Start means we all have to do our part.


It's safest to stay home.

"We recognize that everyone is anxious to get back to some semblance of normalcy, but if we fail to do that carefully, cases of COVID-19 may begin to climb again," Hales said. Riding Strong

Anyone who has been by the Village at Chambers Bay during the COVID-19 shutdown may have noticed that Trek Bikes has been a flurry of activity. Having qualified as an essential business within the transportation category, the store has been open since Governor Inslee announced the Stay Home, Stay Healthy order on March 23.



In fact, the U.P. Trek store has seen business take off since the shutdown, with Store Manager Isaiah Stanley reporting that the business has attracted scores of new customers. "I can't even tell you how many bikes we have sold over the phone," he says. Some of those bikes have been sold to cycling enthusiasts who are familiar with the Trek brand, but Stanley says they have also gained many new customers, including families who found the shutdown was a good time to invest in new bikes or bike repairs so they could ride together.

In addition to selling bikes, the U.P. Trek store has continued to offer inspections and repairs of all bikes (not just Treks) during the shutdown. And as added incentives, they have thrown in free bike washes, curbside pick-up and home delivery.

Stanley says one of the biggest challenges of COVID-19 requirements are how they have forced Trek to make adjustments to its basic business model. "We like to think of ourselves as a hospitality company, not just a bicycle company. So things like social distancing, limits on the number of people we can have in the store at one time and not being able to do test rides have been challenging," he says.

But thanks to a robust commitment to customer service that includes a personal call to each new bike purchaser and repair services regardless of bike manufacturer, Stanley says his store is working to not only survive the pandemic, but generate a whole new customer base as a result of it.

New Sidewalk Construction Begins on Cirque Drive

Construction of new sidewalks and safety improvements has begun along Cirque Drive between 83rd Avenue and Grandview Drive. This

project is the final piece of an eight-year effort to improve the safety and mobility of all users along Cirque Drive throughout the city.

This project will result in a safer street for pedestrians, cyclists and motorists alike, by providing new sidewalks, street lighting, marked crosswalks, improved drainage, and landscaping along this busy street. This project is funded through a \$1.8 million grant from the Federal Highway Administration.

Celebrate Safely

As we move through the recovery stages of the Safe Start program, Independence Day celebrations in the South Sound will be significantly different in 2020. Major events such as Tacoma's Freedom Fair and community fireworks shows in Lakewood and Steilacoom will not take place, therefore local fire department personnel are stressing the importance of safety for those who choose to discharge their own fireworks.

Fireworks Regulations



- ★ May be discharged **ONLY** on July 4 from 9 a.m. to 12 midnight.
- ★ May be purchased from noon on June 28 to 9 p.m. on July 4.
- ★ Must be 16 to purchase, possess and discharge; children under 16 must be under direct adult supervision.
- ★ Must be hand-held and ground based sparking devices which are non-aerial and non-explosive.

Residents of University Place are reminded that:

- Fireworks can only be discharged on July 4 between 9 a.m. to 12 midnight.
- Only hand-held and ground-based sparking devices which are non-aerial and non-explosive are deemed legal for discharge in the City of University Place. These include:
 - Fountains - Ground devices that emit showers of sparks several feet in the air.
 - Cones - A type of fountain in the shape of a cone.
 - Novelties - Snaps, snakes and poppers that often shoot white smoke

- or even multi-colored parachutes.
- Smokes - Items, including smoke balls and aerial items, that produce smoke instead of light or noise. These items are generally used during the daytime.
- Sparklers/Morning Glory - Handheld sticks with a coating of pyrotechnic material that creates sparks when lit. Morning Glory sparklers are a larger thin cardboard tube filled with powder.
- Fireworks must be purchased, possessed and discharged by persons 16 years of age or older. Children under 16 must be under direct adult supervision.
- Violations of the University Place fireworks law are infractions and could lead to a \$250 fine, plus fees, costs and assessments.

"This is going to be a challenging year for all of us who enjoy the 'oohs and aahs' of big fireworks displays," said Jennifer Hales, public safety administrator for the City of University Place. "Without professional pyrotechnic displays, more and more people are going to be tempted to do home shows. We encourage people to visit **Pierce County's dedicated fireworks page** for detailed information on how to stay safe—and that includes how to keep pets safe, too."

A Message from West Pierce Fire & Rescue

The 4th of July is nearly here and West Pierce Fire & Rescue would like to remind residents to celebrate safely, as this is the busiest day of the year for firefighters.

The safest way to enjoy fireworks is by attending a public display - period. However, due to COVID-19 restrictions, most of the displays in the area have been canceled. Therefore, with more households celebrating the 4th of July at home, it is imperative to do it safely.



Please be smart and do not mix alcohol and explosives, keep children away from fireworks and be mindful not only about where you light your fireworks, but also where they will fall. As always, if you have been drinking, please do not drive.
