Human Services Assistance Program

The University Place City Council voted on July 6 to allot \$100,000 to support local families in need as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The funds are part of \$992,700 the City received from the State of Washington as part of the federal CARES Act. The balance of the funds will be used to support local businesses (\$500,000) and to reimburse the City for its COVID-related expenses (\$392,700).

The funds for Human Services Assistance are available to qualified residents of U.P. who can demonstrate a substantial loss of income due to COVID-19. Qualified households: must be a resident of University Place and must be current with rent, utilities and childcare through March 16, 2020. Where allowed, payments will be made directly to landlords, utilities and childcare providers. Grants up to \$3,000 per household can be used to assist with:

- Rent
- Utilities
- Childcare

To ensure these funds are distributed quickly and appropriately, the City has contracted with Families Unlimited Network (FUN) to properly vet and distribute these funds. To find out if you are a candidate for CARES funding, please call Families Unlimited Network at 253.460.3134, Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Qualifying applicants will be determined by appointment only.

Housing Action Plan

Our region is rapidly growing and changing. As these changes occur, it is important that we work together as a community to plan for our shared future. Where will people live? Will housing be affordable for all income levels? How far away from my job will I have to live to find a home I can afford? The City recently received a grant from the Washington State Department of Commerce ("Commerce") to help us better understand issues like these so we can plan together.

The grant allows us to prepare a Housing Action Plan. The Plan consists of two important pieces:

- 1. A Housing Needs Assessment to help us understand: How affordable—or not —housing is today, population and employment trends and future housing needs.
- 2. A Housing Action Plan, based on the results of the Housing Needs Assessment, to help us develop strategies to ensure we offer the right supply of housing to meet future demand.

This project will not result in any policy or code changes but will help identify ideas that the City may consider in the future. This project is an opportunity to focus solely on housing.

Project Next Steps

The Housing Action Plan, including the Housing Needs Assessment will be developed through next spring. The project will conclude by June 30, 2021. We are putting together an Advisory Committee to assist us with project recommendations and developing a project website where all project information will be located. The website will be live within the next 30 days. As draft and final documents are prepared, briefings will take place with both the Planning Commission and City Council. CLEAN-UP RULES:

- LIMIT: 1 load per household for all items EXCEPT for yard waste only loads
- Help us be good neighbors by securing & covering all loads
- For safety reasons, children and pets MUST remain in vehicles
- Photo I.D. WILL BE REQUIRED
- No liquids, paint, or hazardous materials (car batteries are OK)
- No loads larger than a regular pickup truck or equivalent small trailer will be allowed
- No regular household garbage will be allowed
- Residential items only NO commercial material or loads will be allowed
- The size of items cannot exceed 5' in any direction (except for appliances and furniture)

 No fuel tanks, enclosed barrels or drums of any kind. Water heaters and propane tanks are OK

PLEASE SEPARATE ITEMS INTO THE FOLLOWING CATEGORIES FOR RECYCLING:

- Wood items: clean, unpainted lumber, pallets, etc.
- Metal items: scrap steel, appliances, lawn mowers, barbecues, plumbing, etc.
- Yard waste: limbs, grass, leaves, other vegetation, no stumps or limbs larger than 4" in diameter
 - No DIRT, ROCKS, SOD, BLACKBERRIES, SCOTCHBROOM, or OTHER NOXIOUS WEEDS
- Tires: with or without rims
- · Concrete, brick, and stone
- Car batteries
- Electronic waste: computers, monitors, printers, TVs, laptops, cell phones, cameras, etc
