

### U.P. Begins 2024 with Javier Figueroa as Mayor

During its first meeting of the new year on Jan. 2, 2024, the University Place City Council elected Council Member Javier Figueroa to serve as U.P.'s mayor and Council Member Ed Wood to serve as mayor pro tem for the next two years, through the end of 2025. This change in leadership is standard practice in U.P., where the City Council elects these positions on a two-year cycle.

The Jan. 2 meeting also included the swearing in of the City Council's two newest members. Pierce County District Court Judge Karl Williams gave the oath of office to Frank Boykin who was elected to Position 2 in November 2023, while Pierce County Superior Court





Figueroa was the City's mayor pro tem in 2022 and 2023 and served as the City's mayor in 2016 and 2017. He has been a member of the University Place City Council since 2010 and serves on numerous regional organizations, including the executive boards of the Pierce County Regional Council and the Puget Sound Regional Council.

Wood was elected to the U.P. City Council in 2021, beginning his term of service early in November 2021. He has served the last two years as the City's Finance Committee chair and serves on several other regional organizations. He has also served on the Public Safety Advisory Commission since 2010, serving as co-chair

beginning in 2017, and serving as its chair in 2020 to 2021.

## 2023 State of the City Video

Before turning the gavel over to the City's new Mayor Javier Figueroa and resuming his role as a City Council Member, outgoing Mayor Steve Worthington shared a State of the City video presentation at the Jan. 2 City Council meeting that highlighted many of the City's major accomplishments in 2023.

These included a recap of the successful public safety ballot measure and the introduction of the City's new Chief of Police, Pat Burke. The video also covered new investment and business openings in U.P. during 2023 as well as major Public Works projects such as improvements to Chambers Creek Road, the opening of the new 37th Street Court between Drexler Drive and Bridgeport Way, and Cirque Park upgrades.

And as a final reminder of what a special place University Place is, the video features a look back at some of the year's spectacular community events, including Duck Daze, Music on the Square, Movie in the Park, Oktoberfest and the annual Christmas Tree Lighting.

# **Power Outage Preparedness: Tips for Winter Weather**

Power outages, particularly during extreme cold or winter weather, pose significant challenges. Here's a concise guide, based on recommendations from **Ready.gov**, to prepare you and your family:

#### **Plan for Neighbors**

 Develop a plan to check on neighbors, especially those vulnerable like the elderly or disabled, during extreme weather. A solid communication plan is key.

#### **Involve Kids**

• Educate children on emergency preparedness for power outages. They can help with tasks like checking flashlight batteries, collecting blankets and stocking up on non-perishable food.

#### **Save Cell Phone Battery**

 Dim your cell phone screen's brightness to conserve battery life during outages.

#### **General Tips**

- Keep freezers and refrigerators closed to preserve food.
- Use generators only outdoors and away from windows to prevent carbon monoxide poisoning.
- Avoid using gas stoves for heating to prevent fire risks.
- Unplug appliances to protect against electrical surges.
- Plan for alternative power sources for essential medical devices.

#### **Food and Medication Safety**

• Store food and medications safely. A fridge keeps food cold for about 4 hours, a full freezer for 48 hours. Discard food above 40 degrees for over two hours. Consult your healthcare provider(s) about medication storage during outages.

#### **Generator Safety**

 Operate generators outdoors only, far from windows. Be sure to have a carbon monoxide detector installed (with a battery backup). Let generators cool before refueling and adhere to the manufacturer's instructions.

#### **Post-Outage Actions**

• After power restoration, check food and medications. Discard anything suspect to avoid contamination.

Effective preparation and knowledge are vital for dealing with power outages. By following these streamlined tips, your family can stay safe and minimize the outage's impact. Preparation before winter weather is crucial.

### **Curran Apple Orchard Tree Adoptions!**

Curran Apple Orchard Tree Adoptions are now available! Adoptions are a great way for individuals, families and friends to help support this wonderful park and enjoy delicious apples in the Fall!

There are two types of adoptions: **Pruning** (\$45 through April 1) and **Orchard Supporter/Gifts** (\$70 through July 31).



Pruning Adoptions require people to

prune, thin, weed, pick up windfalls and harvest their apples (approximately six visits to orchard per year). Free pruning instruction is available at pruning parties.

Orchard Supporter/Gift Adoptions are a perfect choice for people who want to support the orchard but are unable to prune. Trained volunteers will prune; however, adopters are responsible for weeding, picking up windfalls and harvesting.

All tree adopters will also have an opportunity to participate in a Cider Squeeze later this year. Adoptions are good for one harvest season (January through October). Volunteers are also needed at pruning parties and other events throughout the year.
