Celebrate the Fourth Safely—and Legally

Don't become a statistic this July 4th. According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, there were an estimated 10,200 fireworks-related injuries in 2022. U.P. residents who plan to celebrate Independence Day with fireworks are reminded that only non-aerial and non-explosive fountains, cones, novelties (snakes, poppers), smoke balls and sparklers are legal in the city. Fireworks purchased from stands outside of U.P. may not comply with the City's regulations.

Fireworks can only be discharged in U.P. between the hours of 9 a.m. to midnight on July 4. Violations can be reported online at **FireworksReport.com** from June 28 through July 7. Simply provide a valid address where the violation occurred, the complainant's name and phone number. South Sound 911 staff will share the information with law enforcement agencies electronically or over the radio.

In 2023, **FireworksReport.com** logged 242 calls and 1,084 fireworks complaints. Online reporting frees South Sound 911 dispatchers to respond to life-threatening emergencies on what is the single busiest day for them.

Violations of U.P.'s fireworks regulations could result in fines of up to \$250 plus fees, costs and assessments. Get complete information on the City's fireworks regulations on the Fireworks Rules & Guidelines page.

Village at Chambers Bay Parking Meters Go Live July 22

Initial installation of new parking meters along Market Place West in the Village at Chambers Bay is underway. The meter heads will be installed on July 8 and 9 and tested for several days afterward. They should be active on Monday, July 22.

The 90-minute meters cost \$0.50 for the first half hour. Additional 15-minute increments are \$0.25, with the fee being \$1.50 for the full 90-minutes allowed. The meters are active from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. on weekdays and Saturdays and accept coins, credit cards and the **PaybyPhone** app. Parking is free on Sundays and holidays. ADA stalls are not metered.

There are eight stalls around Market Court and two additional parallel stalls on Market Street by the Civic Building that offer free 15-minute parking for quick stops. In addition, there are more than 500 free parking spaces in the Village at Chambers Bay garage and free parking along Bridgeport Way West.

The new meters will support fair and equitable turnover of parking spots for patrons of Village businesses.

Pierce County Human Services Community Action Programs for the Home

Pierce County Human Services Community Action Programs has many programs that make homes safer and healthier, including services like Home Weatherization, Home Repair, and Energy Assistance.

Are you wondering why your energy costs might be higher than other homes in the area? Through various methods including added insulation, air sealing, and furnace repairs, the Weatherization Assistance Program



helps low-income families reduce energy costs by increasing the energy efficiency of their homes while ensuring their health and safety.

Have you been putting off a much-needed repair? Our Home Repair Program assists in improving housing conditions by providing emergency repairs at no cost to the eligible homeowners living outside the cities of Tacoma and Lakewood. A Housing Rehabilitation Specialist inspects the home and assigns work to contractors. Applicants must have occupied the home for at least one

year.

Need help paying your energy bill? The Energy Assistance Program pays heating bills directly to utility companies. Payments are based on eligible household's fuel usage for the past 12 months and income. If your power is off, call 253.798.3590 and leave a message. Staff will call you back to make an appointment.

Eligibility for these programs is determined by several factors, including the number of people in your household, income sources and more. To learn more and easily apply for these programs online, visit **www.piercecountywa.gov/CAP** or call 253.798.4400.

Yard Sale Signage Regulations

If you're gearing up for summer cleaning and plan to hold a yard sale, be sure to follow the City of U.P.'s sign regulations. Designed to protect the safety of pedestrians, cyclists and motorists, these rules require that:

- Signs cannot be posted before 5 p.m. the day prior to the yard sale and must be removed immediately after.
- Signs are not allowed for more than three successive calendar days in a 30-day period.
- Signs should include the sale date/s and address.
- Signs cannot be placed on street signs or utility poles, in the City's mowing strips adjacent to sidewalks, in roundabouts, medians or planter strips.



Signs should be placed adjacent to the property owner's right-of-way. In addition to promoting safety, these regulations also help reduce visual clutter in U.P. Help us preserve our beautiful streetscapes by sharing this information with your friends and neighbors so we can all work together to keep U.P. safe and inviting.

Report Bark Beetle Infestations



University Place residents who are noticing pine trees on their properties with red needles near the top (or in some cases, over the entire tree) are encouraged to contact the state's **Department of Natural Resources (DNR)**. It is likely the tree has been infested by the California five-spine ips, a bark beetle.

This is a relatively new pest to the Pacific Northwest and one that only affects pine trees such as shore, ponderosa and white pines as well as some ornamental pine species. In addition to red needles, signs of infestation also include small holes with fine, reddish sawdust or large amounts of reddish dust on the bark and at the tree base. Infected trees can turn brown quickly as the beetles brood and eat the cambium layer below the bark.
