#### **Make Plans to Attend a Four Corners Open House**

On Wednesday, Sept. 25, the public is invited to attend lunchtime and evening open houses at Tacoma Community College to learn more about the future of the Four Corners area at the intersection of South 19th and South Mildred streets. Get a glimpse of community feedback received to date and share additional input on how the area could look in 20 years.

The lunchtime open house will run from noon-1:30 p.m. Lunch will be provided. The evening session will be held from 6-8



p.m. and refreshments will be available. Both events will be held in TCC's Opgaard Student Center (6501 19th St., Building 11).

Sound Transit plans to extend Tacoma Link light rail from the Hilltop and Dome districts to TCC as well as Sea-Tac International Airport, Seattle and points further north in King County.

If you were unable to do so earlier this summer, please take a few minutes to complete this **10-question survey** about the area. To date, more than 500 community members have completed the questionnaire. The survey will close Sept. 26.

#### **Puget Sound Starts Here**


Did you know that the cost of stormwater pollution in the Puget Sound region is expected to exceed \$1 billion over the next 10 years, with significant risks to the state's shellfish industry?

That market segment brings in over \$100 million in sales every year, but over the last 40 years, polluted waters have caused 30 percent of Puget Sound's shellfish growing areas to close.

So, what can you do to mitigate stormwater pollution?

- Fix oil or other fluid leaks on your vehicles. Toxic chemicals from those materials reach Puget Sound through storm drains.
- Garden wisely. Plant native flora; reduce the use of pesticides; water infrequently but deeply.
- **Scoop.** Dog poop is not fertilizer. If left on the ground, it can spread bacteria and parasites that rainwater carries to streams, lakes and Puget Sound. This creates unsafe swimming and fishing conditions.

Everyone has a part to play in keeping Puget Sound free of contamination.



#### **How Would You Reimagine Cirque Park?**

Based on feedback from previous public meetings and FlashVote surveys, the City of U.P. is conducting a more comprehensive survey designed to collect additional community input on the future of Cirque Park, including new and enhanced amenities.

Through earlier outreach efforts, including a public meeting in April, residents indicated they would like to see a splash pad and water walk, pickleball/sports courts and an event open lawn in Cirque Park. Now the



public is encouraged to **weigh in** on the design options and cost estimates that reflect those preferences.

Following this additional opportunity for community input, an architectural firm will begin work on a refined concept.

This **survey** will be open until October 7, 2024.

#### **Coffee with Cory**

U.P.'s Community Outreach Officer Cory Shears has begun holding a series of casual get-togethers with the public to share updates on his work in the community. He has already met with apartment residents and invited Rachel Adler, Emergency Preparedness Coordinator for West Pierce Fire & Rescue, to join him to share important information on how to be ready for natural disasters or other emergencies.

This is a great way to learn more about the City's community outreach work addressing chronic nuisance issues, preventative park safety patrols, assisting U.P. police with non-crime related community concerns and triaging resources for the homeless.

Representatives of the Pierce County Assessor's Office and South Sound Housing Affordability Partners will share important information on qualifying income categories (and the differences

In addition, there will also be information available on energy assistance and home repair programs as well as veterans' services.

Residents NORTH of 40th St W. Saturday, Oc. 5 from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Residents SOUTH of 40th St W. Saturday, Oct. 12 from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Dispose of and/or recycle some unwanted items and yard waste for FREE!



#### Clean Up Rules:

Limit: 1 load per household for all items
EXCEPT for yard waste only loads.
Help us be good neighbors by securing &
covering all loads. For safety reasons, children and pets MUST remain in vehicles.

- Photo I.D. WILL BE REQUIRED
- No liquids, paint, or hazardous materials (car batteries are OK)
- No loads larger than a regular pickup truck or equivalent small trailer will be allowed
- No regular household garbage will be allowed

- Residential items only NO commercial material or loads will be allowed
- The size of items cannot exceed 5' in any direction (except for appliances and furniture)
- No fuel tanks, enclosed barrels or drums of any kind. Water heaters and propane tanks are OK

Please separate items into the following categories for recycling:

- Wood items: clean, unpainted lumber, pallets, etc.
- Metal items: scrap steel, appliances, lawn mowers, barbecues, plumbing, etc.
- Yard waste: limbs, grass, leaves, other vegetation, no stumps or limbs larger than 4" in diameter
- No DIRT, ROCKS, SOD, BLACKBERRIES, SCOTCHBROOM, or OTHER NOXIOUS WEEDS
- Tires: with or without rims
- Concrete, brick, and stone
- Car batteries
