Important Reminders on Snow and Ice Removal on U.P. Streets

When snow and ice are in the forecast, please remember that the City of University Place follows a tiered approach to anti-icing and snow removal. Main arterials such as Grandview Drive, Bridgeport Way West, Cirque Drive West and 27th Street West are the highest priority. Chambers Creek Road, Alameda Avenue West, 44th Street West and Sunset Drive West are secondary



routes. Neighborhood and side streets are addressed last.

Please reference the **snow removal and anti-icing maps** for specifics.

Also be sure to give the City's Public Works trucks plenty of room and patience as they work to make the streets safe for all motorists.

Sewer Line Repairs Begin on Bridgeport Way

Beginning the week of Feb. 2, motorists along Bridgeport Way between 75th Street West and 67th Avenue West may encounter delays as Pierce County crews begin work to mark utilities prior to urgent repair or replacement of damaged sewer pipes.



Prior to beginning repair, a sewer bypass will be installed between 75th Street West and 67th Avenue West to divert most or all of the wastewater flow and prevent further damage to the pipe until the repair begins. Work is expected to last at least six months.

Although the majority of the repair work will occur south of University Place, there may be impacts to traffic patterns in U.P. Motorists are encouraged to take alternate routes and to be patient and courteous when navigating any lane closures or detours.

WPFR Welcomes New Commissioner

At the West Pierce Fire & Rescue Board of Commissioners meeting on Tuesday, Feb. 4, Commissioner Marshal (Scott) Dellinger was sworn in to fill the vacancy for Position 5.

Commissioner Dellinger, nominated in December and appointed Jan. 21, serves as a Captain with Puget Sound Regional Fire Authority, where he has worked for 27 years. He retired from the U.S. Air Force Reserves in 2019 after 32 years of military service. He also serves on the board of The Daffodil Festival.



He will hold the seat through the remainder of 2025. An election will be held later this year to fill the next six-year term, from 2026 to 2031.
