This seven-member group of citizens advises the City Council on growth management, general land use and other matters as directed by the City Council. The



Commission also holds hearings on and develops a comprehensive plan for the City, making recommendations to the Council on amendments to the Comprehensive Plan, the Zoning Code and Map, and the development regulations of the City.

The Commission meets on the first and third Wednesday of each month at 7 p.m. at City Hall and encourages citizen input at its meetings and public hearings.



Keeping University Place a safe and beautiful community is a team effort, and you can help by reporting non-emergency issues through SeeClickFix. Whether it's a pothole, overgrown vegetation, streetlight outage, illegal dumping, or park maintenance concern, SeeClickFix makes it easy to notify the City and track the resolution—all from your phone or computer!

How to Report an Issue

Using SeeClickFix is quick and convenient. Simply drop a pin on a map or type in the location, provide a brief description, and attach a photo if possible. The platform streamlines communication and ensures that your concern is directed to the appropriate City department.

You can report an issue in two ways:

Desktop:

- 1. Visit the **Code Enforcement** page on the City website.
- 2. Identify the location of the issue in the "Search for Location or Address" bar to begin.

Mobile:

- 1. Download the SeeClickFix app from the Google Play Store or Apple App Store
- 2. Install and open the app
- 3. Select "University Place, WA" as your service area

Why Use SeeClickFix?

- **Efficiency:** No need to call or email—just submit your concern in minutes.
- **Transparency:** Track the status of your request and see updates as the City addresses it.
- Community Impact: Help keep University Place clean, safe and well-maintained.

This year's cleanup will be at Colegate Park on Saturday, April 19 from 9 a.m. to noon. The park is located just north of Curtis High School. Volunteers will perform trail maintenance, weeding and other general cleanup of this 12-acre undeveloped natural site.



Participants are encouraged to bring their own tools and gloves (make sure they are labeled with owner information). U.P. Parks staff will provide additional rakes and shovels for those who do not have their own. The event's co-sponsor, University Place Refuse and Recycling, will provide snacks, water and t-shirts in the staging area behind the school tennis courts.

The cleanup will occur rain or shine and offers high school students the opportunity to earn three hours of community service for participating.

Call 988 Lifeline for Mental Health Support

Did you know that trained counselors are staffing the 988 Lifeline alongside South Sound 911 dispatchers in the call center to deliver emotional support, crisis counseling and access to essential resources?

South Sound 911 call takers will assess if a transfer to a 988 Lifeline counselor is appropriate. Those dialing 988 directly are connected to a 988 counselor without transfer from South Sound 911.



This groundbreaking collaboration is the first of its kind in Washington. 988

Lifeline (formerly known as the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline) offers 24/7 call, text and chat access to crisis counselors who can help those experiencing suicidal, substance abuse and/or mental health crisis or emotional distress.

According to 988 Lifeline statistics, less than 10 percent of all calls handled by a 988 counselor result in a higher level of intervention; less than 2 percent require law enforcement or emergency medical services response.

Stopping Shoplifters in their Tracks

U.P. Police Department Community
Outreach Officer Cory Shears has
invited a representative from the
Pierce County Sheriff's Office to
share important tips on loss
prevention with small business
owners. This special two-hour course
will be held at noon on Monday,
March 24 at UPPD Headquarters,
3612 Drexler Drive W.

Every year, small businesses incur big losses due to shoplifting.

According to Capital One Research:



- At least 85.5 percent of small businesses experience retail theft annually.
- 74.8 percent of brick-and-mortar small businesses say they experience customers shoplifting monthly; 52.7 percent report shoplifting weekly or more frequently.
- Small businesses lose an average of \$1,686 per month to retail theft.

Local business owners will learn what kind of essential information the police need when responding to shoplifting and get information on how to complete a shoplifting report. There will also be a question-and-answer session which can lead to important information sharing among local business owners.

For easiest access to the session, go to the third floor of the parking garage near the exterior elevator.

Dispose of and/or recycle some unwanted items and yard waste for FREE!



Clean-Up Rules:

Limit: 1 load per household for all items EXCEPT for yard waste only loads Help us be good neighbors by securing & covering all loads.

- For safety reasons, children and pets MUST remain in vehicles
- Photo I.D. WILL BE REQUIRED
- No liquids, paint, or hazardous materials (car batteries are OK)
- No loads larger than a regular pickup truck or equivalent small trailer will be allowed
- No regular household garbage will be allowed
- Residential items only NO commercial material or loads will be allowed
- The size of items cannot exceed 5' in any direction (except for appliances and furniture)
- No fuel tanks, enclosed barrels or drums of any kind. Water heaters and propane tanks are OK

Please separate items into the following categories for recycling:

- Wood items: clean, unpainted lumber, pallets, etc.
- Metal items: scrap steel, appliances, lawn mowers, barbecues, plumbing, etc.
- Yard waste: limbs, grass, leaves, other vegetation, no stumps or limbs larger than 4" in diameter
- No DIRT, ROCKS, SOD, BLACKBERRIES, SCOTCHBROOM, or OTHER NOXIOUS WEEDS
- Tires: with or without rims
- Concrete, brick, and stone
- Car batteries
