Tree and Sidewalk Repairs Begin this Week on 27th Street West

Beginning today, April 16, the City will be removing trees on 27th Street West in front of the U.S. Post Office. The following week, work will begin on repairs to the sidewalks that stretch from the entrance and exit points to the Post Office parking lot. The inside lane of 27th Street West will be closed while that work is conducted.



When the sidewalk repairs are finished, the City will plant new trees to replace those that were removed.

As always, work crews ask for and appreciate your patience while they complete the project.

Cirque Park's All-Inclusive Playground Slated to Open in May

Finishing touches, including the installation of rubber tile surfacing, are being put on the new inclusive playground at Cirque Park. Designed to be accessible to children of all abilities, the playground will feature equipment that can be accessed by ramps and include elements such as accessible swings and play components that support diverse sensory needs.



Weather permitting, current plans call for the playground to open for use in early May, with an official ribbon cutting celebration scheduled for later in the month. Watch future issues of Headlines for more details.

The Cirque Park inclusive playground is funded through local donations and grants, with support from the Cal Ripken, Sr. Foundation.

New Construction Underway in Village at Chambers Bay

Construction crews are hard at work at the northeast corner of Bridgeport Way West and 37th Street West, adjacent to the building that houses Five Guys, Orange Theory and MOD Pizza.



Plans call for a new 11,000-square-foot building (rendering pictured) to occupy the lot, which will ultimately house four commercial tenants. When finished, the project will complete the portion of the Village at Chambers Bay that stretches from 37th Street to Whole Foods on the east side of Bridgeport Way.

Draft Middle Housing Code Available for Public

During its March 19 meeting, the U.P. Planning Commission reviewed the City's plans for middle housing, including draft code amendments, design standards and unit lot subdivision amendments. These changes are required under House Bill 1110, which was passed by the State in 2023 to help increase housing supply statewide.

Middle housing refers to housing types that are between (or in the middle of) single-family houses and large apartment complexes. This includes buildings such as townhouses, duplexes, triplexes, fourplexes, courtyard housing and mother-in-law units (accessory dwelling units).

The City has created a **special webpage** that enables the public to review in greater detail its recommendations for middle housing. It includes illustrations that show what middle housing would look like in areas zoned Residential 1 (R1) and Residential 2 (R2) in U.P. After visiting the webpage, residents are encouraged to email their comments to **Kennith George**, the City's planning manager.

Volunteer dentists and hygienists hope to be able to see 200 or more patients over the course of the two days, but the total number will depend upon the number of dental professionals who volunteer to participate.

27th Street Business District Draft Plan to go

During its meeting on Monday, May 5, the City Council will hold a study session on the draft plan for the 27th Street Business District.

The draft plan is the result of more than a year of work by City staff, including a community survey that asked residents and business owners for thoughts on what they would like the area to look like in the future. The goal was to identify policies,



actions and projects that will support growth, population and employment forecasts for this historic business center.

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Pickup Returns This May!

University Place residents, get ready to clear out those big branches and bulky brush! The 2025 Spring Oversized Brush Curbside Pickup is happening from May 5–16, offering a convenient way to dispose of large yard debris that doesn't fit in your regular yard waste cart.



This special service is available to all residential customers, even if you don't subscribe to yard waste service.

Just place your oversized brush out on the same day as your recycling or yard waste pickup during the scheduled weeks—but remember, pickup happens only once in your neighborhood.

Pile Limitations: 1 per household no larger than 6' wide by 6' long by 6' high.

The Oversized Brush Pickup is only for the larger brush and limbs that do not easily fit into a regular yard waste cart. Limbs are removed by machine or pitchfork. Sweeping of small items by the customer can be expected.

Yes, Oversized Brush Includes: branches, brush, and limbs no larger than 6' in length or 4" in diameter. Please stack loose for pickup (no cans, bags, or bundles).

No, Oversized Brush Does Not Include: blackberry, holly, or other thorny vegetation; stumps, limbs larger than 6' or thicker than 4"; small loose items such as grass, leaves, weeds, bark, pine/fir needles, etc. No noxious weeds like scotchbroom or English ivy, etc.

If you are signed up for yard waste service, please make maximum use of your cart before placing brush in a pile. Place your oversized brush in a loose pile at the curb or within five feet of the drivable portion of the roadway for pickup. Make sure the pile isn't in the street or blocking access to mailboxes or fire hydrants.

Sniff Out and Report Pollution

To ensure the health and safety of our stormwater system and waterways, residents are encouraged to identify and eliminate sources of pollution. This includes reporting discharges, spills or dumping of illegal substances into our storm drains. These kinds of items are often identified by:

- Chemical smells
- Foamy residues
- Oily sheen or colored liquids
- Sewage odors
- Muddy construction runoff

Call the City's Illicit Discharge Hotline at 253.208.7925 to report suspicious discharges. City staff will respond, investigate the source and clean up any ongoing pollution.
