**Duck Daze Parade Registration Deadline is May 23** 



School groups, businesses and community organizations that want to be a part of the madness and mayhem of the Duck Daze parade on June 7 must submit a **completed parade registration packet** by May 23.

The Parade will have a modified route this year to improve spectators' safety and viewing. It will begin at 10 a.m. at the intersection of Bridgeport Way West and 29th Street, proceeding in the southbound lanes of Bridgeport Way until 35th Street. At that time, the parade will continue south, but in the northbound lanes of Bridgeport, passing in front of the Village at Chambers Bay to provide additional viewing areas. The procession will turn left at 37th Street Court West and end at Drexler Drive.

As part of the day's festivities, West Pierce Fire & Rescue Station 31 (3631 Drexler Drive W.) will host an Open House from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. with free hot dogs, refreshments and displays of their fire equipment, as well as vehicles from the Pierce County Sheriff and U.P. Police departments.

Following the parade, there will also be lots of fun festivities in the Village at Chambers Bay. Joel Gibson Jr. will take the main stage with his blend of country rock, Reptile Isle will take over the Civic Building Atrium, and the South Sound Makers Market will feature more than 50 handmade vendors. There will be food trucks, children's activities and games for all ages.

#### **Update on Traffic Enforcement**



In March, U.P. Police Chief Pat Burke hosted another Coffee with the Chief event that enabled community members to meet UPPD staff and patrol officers to ask questions about their public safety concerns. The event was very well attended, with traffic and speed-related complaints topping the list of residents' concerns.

As a result, Chief Burke invited community members to send specific information, including the location, primary days of the week and times of day when problem(s) persist to **uppublicsafety@cityofup.com**.

Residents have responded, forwarding to U.P. Public Safety 13 specific locations in just over the last month and a half where speeding is an issue. In response to this, UPPD patrol officers dedicated more than 20 hours of traffic and speed enforcement in these areas on 35 separate occasions.

"One of the main concerns I often hear are comparisons of University Place traffic enforcement efforts to those of our smaller neighbors," Burke said. "U.P. is significantly larger than our neighboring communities of Fircrest and Steilacoom and we face a different challenge in terms of staffing, types of calls for service, and numbers of calls for service." Community members are encouraged to continue to report their speeding and traffic concerns to **uppublicsafety@cityofup.com**. Interested volunteers can also register to participate in a traffic safety focus group that is being formed to better understand the public's opinions about potential traffic revisions and/or enhancements that could be recommended to the Council in the future.

"We appreciate the level of engagement our community has shown in helping us address this issue," Burke said. "Our patrol officers can't be all places at all times, so we want to continue to work together with the public to find ways to be as efficient as possible with our resources and provide a high level of service."

#### Who was Judge Thomas Chambers?

Born in 1795 in Belfast, Ireland, Judge Thomas Chambers is a name that shows up all over University Place—Chambers Creek, Chambers Bay Golf Course, the Village at Chambers Bay, and more. But who was he?

Here's a clue: take a look at the face on the \$20 bill. That's right—President Andrew Jackson plays a role in this story. Jackson



was a cousin of Chambers' wife, Letitia. As a wedding gift, the president gave the young couple 500 acres of land in Tennessee to begin their new life in America.


So, they set sail across the Atlantic, leaving their native Ireland behind. Once in the U.S., Thomas Chambers managed cotton and tobacco farms on behalf of President Jackson.

#### Fluid Leaks Harm More than Just Your Car

When you spy a puddle of fluid on your garage floor or driveway, it's your car's way of telling you something is wrong.

But that puddle presents a danger to our waterways as well, because run off of oil and other automotive fluids can end up in our stormwater system, and ultimately our rivers, streams and lakes. Do you want your kids or pets playing in puddles or streams that are polluted with toxic fluids?

If you discover a leak, clean up spills immediately using dry kitty litter, then sweep it up, bag it and dispose in the garbage. It is illegal to discharge pollutants to storm drains so be sure to properly recycle or dispose of used batteries, motor oil,



antifreeze and other hazardous wastes at the **Tacoma Recovery & Transfer facility** at 3510 S. Mullen St. (253.502.2100).
