tournament memorabilia. The event honored all the volunteers who helped make the event a success and celebrated Chambers Bay's reputation as a premier links course.

## **Consider Our Veterans During Fireworks Season**

As the 4th of July nears, please keep in mind that for many of our veterans, fireworks can trigger PTSD. One of those veterans is the City's own Mayor Pro Tem Ed Wood.

"Many veterans can find the 4th of July a difficult holiday to celebrate. For me, the concussive thump in the chest from large fireworks reminds me of explosions I experienced while deployed in Iraq. Honestly, I would rather be anywhere else than where fireworks are happening," he said.

With that in mind, Wood and public safety professionals encourage residents to attend official fireworks shows instead of setting off fireworks at home. But if you do decide to set off fireworks, remember these key points:

- Fireworks are only legal for discharge in U.P. on July 4 from 9 a.m. to midnight.
- The only fireworks legal for discharge in the city are ground-based sparking devices, non-aerial and non-explosive such as fountains, cones, novelties (snaps, snakes, poppers), sparklers/morning glories and smokes (smoke balls or aerials).
- Fireworks must be purchased, possessed and discharged by persons 16 or older. Children under 16 must be under direct adult supervision.

As Mayor Pro Tem Wood says, "When it comes to fireworks, have fun and be safe. And please think of others as well."



#### **Scammers Never Sleep**

The U.P. Police Department urges residents, especially the elderly, to be alert at all times for scammers posing as banks, health care providers or government officials in an attempt to obtain sensitive financial information or money.

Hallmarks of scams include:

- Unsolicited contact
- Fear, intimidation or pressure to act quickly
- Requests to be paid via cash, Zelle or Venmo, or gift cards which make it difficult to track their activity

UPPD has seen scams that begin with an email, phone call or text message about online accounts such as Amazon or Apple. If these messages are responded to, the scammers ask for cash to be withdrawn from the victim's accounts and placed in a box or envelope that the scammers then pick up from the victim's home.

If you believe someone has attempted to scam you—or someone you know—please call the 24-hour non-emergency line at 253.287.4455. Residents can also report the scam to the National Elder Fraud Hotline at 833.372.8311.



# Fun Facts in History: The Life of Judge Thomas Chambers, Chapter 2

When we last shared the Chambers story, Thomas and his wife Letitia



were happily homesteading 500 acres in Tennessee, land given to them as a wedding gift by Letitia's cousin, President Andrew Jackson.

That changed when Thomas came across the journals of Lewis and Clark, detailing their Corps of Discovery expedition from 1802 to 1804. His curiosity was instantly piqued, and he soon decided the family should seek a new beginning in the Pacific Northwest. Preparing for the arduous journey, through Native American lands and along the Oregon Trail, took many months as they packed up their belongings and livestock.

#### **Signs of the Times**

It's garage sale season in U.P. which means signs advertising the location of garage and yard sales are popping up all over town. If you are hosting a sale, be sure to follow the City's signage requirements:

- Yard/garage sale signs cannot be posted before 5 p.m. the day prior to the sale and must be removed immediately after the sale ends.
- Signs are not allowed for more than three successive calendar days in a 30-day period.
- Signs should include the sale date/s and address.
- Signs may only be placed on property up to the edge of the right-of-way. They cannot be placed on street signs or utility poles, in the City's mowing strips adjacent to sidewalks, in roundabouts, medians or planter strips.



These **regulations** help keep the streets and signposts of University Place from becoming cluttered with out-of-date signs while also improving visibility for pedestrians, cyclists and motorists.

#### **Get Down and Dirty at Adriana Hess Work Party**

The Pierce Conservation District will hold a work party at Adriana Hess Park (2917 Morrison Rd. W.) this Saturday, June 14 from 10 a.m. to noon. Volunteers are needed to help remove invasive species, non-native trees and English ivy.

Afterward, mulch will be spread to reduce regrowth of invasive weeds. These efforts support water quality, wildlife and pollinators. Please note that youth volunteers under the age of 14 must be accompanied by a parent or quardian.





#### **Keep it Clean**

If you're itching to give your car a good wash to get rid of winter's grit and grime, please keep in mind that the water you rinse off your car contains oil, grease, heavy metals and soaps that end up in our storm drains—and ultimately Puget Sound.

That's why it's better to use commercial car washes since they are required to treat their dirty wash water. But if that's not an option for you, use biodegradable soap and wash your car in a grassy area so the grass and soil can soak up the wash water before it reaches a storm drain.
