# Don't Miss It! U.P.'s 30th Birthday Bash This Saturday

The party is expected to draw a very large crowd so the City of U.P. will run courtesy shuttles to and from Cirque Park from Market Square and Evergreen Primary School beginning at 11 a.m., with the last shuttles departing following the grand finale Glow Show after 9 p.m. Only ADA and entertainer parking will be available at the park that day so please plan ahead.

Furry Friends Fair: The Tacoma-Pierce County Humane Society will be on site


to tempt attendees with some of its furry friends that are looking for new adoptive homes.

# New Inclusive Playground Ribbon Cutting at Cirque Park on Aug. 28



The City of University Place, in conjunction with the University Place Parks and Recreation Foundation (UPPRF) and the Cal Ripken, Sr. Foundation, will hold a ribbon cutting ceremony for the new All Inclusive Playground at Cirque Park (7250 Cirque Drive W.) next Thursday, Aug. 28 at 10 a.m.

The festivities will officially open the new play area that is designed to remove physical and social barriers so children can play and interact together, regardless of their needs or abilities. It features a cushioned, rubberized surface that enables those in wheelchairs or with impaired vision to safely access the play equipment that includes ramps, accessible swings and play components that support diverse sensory needs.


The City of U.P. and the U.P. Parks and Recreation Foundation (UPPRF) secured grants and private donations to create the new playground, including support from the Cal Ripken, Sr. Foundation. Additional funding came from the Names Family Foundation, the Cheney Foundation and Sunderland Foundation, as well as more than 60 individuals, businesses and other private foundations.

#### **U.P. Students Return to School Next Week**

The University Place School District will open the 2025-26 school year next Tuesday, Aug. 26. Motorists are asked to leave extra time in their daily schedules for increased traffic on the roads, including buses, bike riders and walkers.

Parents are encouraged to share these important safety reminders with their children:

 Always use sidewalks, cross the street at the corner, obey traffic signals and stay in the crosswalk. Never run out into the street or cross between parked cars.

- Cyclists should always wear a helmet and ride in the same direction as traffic.
- Bus riders should stay in clear view of the bus driver. Stand away from the curb while waiting for the bus to arrive and never walk behind the bus.

Motorists are reminded that when a school bus activates its yellow flashing lights it means the bus is getting ready to stop. Red flashing lights and an extended stop sign indicate children are getting on or off the bus. Stop until the red lights have stopped flashing, the stop arm is withdrawn, and all children have reached safety. Passing a stopped school bus may result in a fine of \$500.

# Road Closure at 36th & Grandview Through Sept. 12

Grandview Drive West at 36th Street West is closed to through traffic until Sept. 12. This closure includes bike lanes and sidewalks, though local access is still allowed. Detours are in place to help keep traffic moving during this time.

The closure is necessary to complete construction of a new roundabout at the intersection, a project designed to



improve traffic flow and enhance safety for drivers, cyclists and pedestrians. The 36th Street location was selected after studying traffic patterns, safety data and available space. Other nearby intersections would have impacted nearby residential property, so this site offered the best balance of safety, efficiency and minimal impact on neighboring homes.

The original goal was to start and finish construction before school began, but a few unexpected delays shifted the schedule. Closing the road now allows crews to work more quickly and efficiently, which should help shorten the overall timeline and reduce long-term disruption.

Once complete, the roundabout will encourage safer speeds and smoother travel through this busy area, providing lasting benefits for the community.

# Yard Sale Season is Here: Know the Rules for Posting Signs

It's that time of year when garage and yard sales pop up across University Place, and so do the signs pointing people to them. If you're planning a sale, make sure your signs follow the City's guidelines:

**Timing matters:** Signs can go up after 5 p.m. the day before your sale and must come down as soon as it ends.

**Duration limit:** Signs can't be posted for more than three consecutive days within a 30-day period.

**Details required:** Include your sale date(s) and address on every sign.



**Location rules:** Signs can only be placed on private property up to the edge of the right-of-way. They're not allowed on street signs, utility poles, mowing strips next to sidewalks, roundabouts, medians or planter strips.

These rules help keep U.P. looking tidy and ensure clear sightlines for drivers, cyclists and pedestrians. A little care with your signs goes a long way in keeping our community safe and welcoming.

### **Curran Apple Orchard Cider Squeeze**

Crunchy apples and delicious cider await at the annual Curran Apple Orchard Cider Squeeze on Saturday, Aug. 23, from 10 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.

Curran Orchard Tree Adopters will receive first priority in squeezing apples. The public is also welcome to sign up on a "standby list" for any available slots by contacting **curranappleorchard@gmail.com**. Any remaining slots will be available on a first



come, first serve basis. Due to a limited number of presses, we strongly encourage reservations!

#### **Cider Squeeze Procedure**

- No Outside Apples! This includes homegrown or from the grocery store to prevent the spread of disease, only apples picked from the Curran Orchard.
- DO NOT PICK FROM TREES THAT ARE TAPED OR MARKED with signs.

These trees are adopted, saved for school tours or just aren't ready to be picked yet! You CAN pick from any unmarked tree OR you can purchase a bag of apples for \$5 (cash only). Recommended two bags per pressing.

- Bring your own bags and pick apples at least 30 minutes before your time slot. Please limit yourself to two grocery bags to ensure others can enjoy apples as well.
- Half-gallon jugs will be available for purchase (\$1 each, cash only) OR you can bring containers. Expect to obtain approximately one gallon of juice per pressing time.
- You can squeeze approximately two crates of washed apples per pressing time. (About two plastic grocery bags worth). If there are open slots, you will be allowed to go through the line again to press additional apples.

#### Interested in volunteering? There are several shifts available!

Any volunteers will receive priority for pressing slots!

- 8:30-9:45 a.m. Set up stations, tables, signage and awnings
- 9:45 a.m.-1:30 p.m. Assist at various stations (Check in, washing area, apple/jug sales, press area, wheelbarrows, windfall pick-up, etc.)
- 1:30-3 p.m. Take down

**Community Harvest Day** will take place this year on Sunday, Aug. 31 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

If you miss the squeeze, don't despair! You can harvest apples from any tree that is not taped or marked with a sign. Please limit yourself to two bags to ensure everyone gets a chance to enjoy the orchard!

#### **Be Stormwater Wise**

U.P.'s proximity to Puget Sound means residents and business owners need to pay special attention to what goes into the City's storm drains. Water that flows into the stormwater system may be polluted with chemicals, dirt and other debris from insecticides, pesticides, auto fluids, pet waste and solvents. This untreated water can find its way to our fisheries and recreational waters, as well as increase the costs of providing safe drinking water to our community.

Remember that untreated stormwater runoff can:

- Poison aquatic life, including the fish or shellfish we may eat.
- Increase the levels of bacteria and other pathogens that flow into swimming and fishing areas.
- Cloud local waterways with sediment that can destroy aquatic habitats.
- Cause algae blooms that ultimately remove oxygen from water, impacting fish and other aquatic organisms.
- Kill ducks, fish, turtles and birds, especially debris such as cigarette butts, six-pack rings and plastic bags.

Please do your part to protect our waterways by taking steps to eliminate stormwater pollution.
