Council Member Boykin Earns Certificate of Municipal Leadership

City Council Member Frank Boykin was recently presented with a Certificate of Municipal Leadership (CML) from the Association of Washington Cities. To earn the certification, Boykin had to complete a minimum of 30 CML credits, including training workshops in five competency areas such as budgeting and financial management; infrastructure, transportation and land use; and legal requirements, roles, responsibilities and ethics.

"I learned so much from this program," Boykin said. "In addition to the trainings, it also gave me an opportunity to interact with other elected officials from across the state and learn from their experiences. I feel this will make me a better-



informed leader and advocate for the residents and businesses of University Place."

The CML program provides elected officials with the knowledge they need to effectively operate within the law so they can plan for the future, secure and manage funds, foster strong relationships, and work to build more equitable communities.

UPTV and Pierce County TV Take Home National Honors

At the annual National Association of Telecommunications Officers and Advisors (NATOA) awards ceremonies in New Orleans, UPTV took home three first place awards for the following videos:

On Thursday, Aug. 28, Cirque Park was filled with the sounds of laughter and delight as the City of University Place, in conjunction with the University Place Parks and Recreation Foundation (UPPRF) and the Cal Ripken, Sr. Foundation, held the official ribbon cutting ceremony for the new Inclusive Playground at the park.

Numerous dignitaries were on hand for the event, including State Sen. T'wina Nobles, State Rep. Mari Leavitt and U.P. City Council Members Denise McCluskey, Frank Boykin and Melanie Grassi. They were joined by representatives from several of the project's donors as well as by members of the UP Parks and Rec Foundation and the City's Public Works Department, who were instrumental in bringing the project to fruition.

But the real stars of the day were the children of all abilities who wasted no time trying out the new equipment. The playground features a cushioned, rubberized surface that enables those in wheelchairs or with impaired vision to safely access the play equipment that includes ramps and accessible swings and play components that support diverse sensory needs and give every child a chance to play.

Is Your Pet Licensed?

It's a pet owner's worst nightmare: you come home to discover that your beloved animal is missing. You can help alleviate much of the stress of that situation, however, by ensuring that your furry friend has a City of U.P. pet license. If your pet is ever lost, the license provides the information necessary to return them to you quickly.



But it's also the law. Per City ordinance, all pets eight weeks and older are required to be licensed in the City of U.P. Simply visit the **City's website** for information and instructions for payment. It takes just a minute but may save hours of heartache and stress.

Pet license fees for cats and dogs include discounts for senior and disabled residents. All pets that are spayed/neutered also qualify for reduced fees. License fees fund Pierce County's Animal Control services which assist with lost or stray animals, abused animals, barking dogs and leash law violations.

Grab Coffee with a Cop on Oct. 1

9/11 Remembrance Ceremony at West Pierce

West Pierce Fire & Rescue invites the community to join us on Thursday, Septem 11, at 5:30 p.m. for a memorial ceremony remembering the lives lost on September 11, 2001. Fire Chief Jim Sharp will offer remarks alongside other speakers from WPFR, local law enforcement, the City of Lakewood, and the City of University Place. The ceremony will take place outside at Reflection Park, located in front of WPFR Station 31 at 3631 Drexler Drive in University Place.

For those unable to attend, we encourage you and your families to visit Reflection Park at your own time for reflection. The park honors and lists the nearly 3,000 lives lost that day, featuring the "Weeping Wall" water memorial with 403 etched grooves representing the fallen firefighters, paramedics, and police officers. At the park's center stands a piece of



steel from the World Trade Center, brought from New York to Washington by WPFR firefighters in 2012.


We invite our community to stand with us as we remember the victims, support their families, and honor the countless heroes whose courage continue to inspire us.

Water Ways

The City of University Place has eight stormwater basins that catch water from drains in U.P. neighborhoods. All of the water that flows into these basins eventually ends up in Puget Sound. The map below provides more details and

specific basin boundaries.

Remember to do your part to keep pollutants and contaminants from cars, pets and lawns from entering the storm drains. Together, we can make Puget Sound cleaner, healthier and safer for those who fish and play in its waters.



- 1. **Day Island and Soundview drainage basins**: In these basins, the storm water is collected in both pipes and open ditches that drain directly to Puget Sound.
- Morrison Pothole drainage area: In this area, storm water drains to the Morrison Wetland located between Morrison road and 67th Avenue, immediately adjacent to the Adriana Wetland Park (on Morrison). In high storm events, this wetland overflows into the Day Island basin that drains into the Sound.
- 3. **Crystal Springs Creek basin**: In this area, storm drainage drains directly to Crystal Creek at the north end of the City. This creek runs into Puget Sound at the Day Island lagoon.
- 4. **Curtis Pothole**: This area in the center of the City drains to a depressed area near Curtis High School. From there the water ponds and eventually infiltrates into the groundwater.
- 5. **Leach Creek basin**: Storm water in this area on the east side of the City drains directly into Leach Creek. Both Silver and Chum salmon use this creek for spawning. This creek ultimately runs into Chambers Creek near the Kobayashi park.

- 6. **Chambers Creek basin**: Storm water in this basin drains to Chambers Creek either directly into the creek or though Peach Creek. Chambers Creek supports Silver, Chum and Chinook salmon and runs into the sound at Chambers Bay.
- 7. **West Side basins**: Storm water in the southwest area of the City either infiltrates into the groundwater or drains directly to Puget Sound.
- 8. **Flett Creek basin**: Water in this area drains to the south into Lakewood and ultimately runs into Flett Creek. This creek joins into Chambers Creek near the Kobayashi park.

U.P. Refuse & Recycling Fall Clean Up

Residents north of 40th St W. Saturday, Oct. 4, 8 a.m. - 4 p.m.

Residents south of 40th St W. Saturday, Oct. 11, 8 a.m. - 4 p.m.

Dispose of and/or recycle some unwanted items and yard waste for free!

Clean Up Rules:

- Limit: 1 load per household for all items EXCEPT for yard waste only loads
- Help us be good neighbors by securing & covering all loads
- For safety reasons, children and pets MUST remain in vehicles
- Photo I.D. will be required
- No liquids, paint, or hazardous materials (car batteries are OK)
- No loads larger than a regular pickup truck or equivalent small trailer will be allowed
- No box trucks/oversized commercial trucks will be allowed
- Dump trailers/truck beds must be offloaded by hand, unless it's a yard waste load
- No regular household garbage will be allowed
- Residential items only NO commercial material or loads will be allowed
- The size of items cannot exceed 5' in any direction (except for appliances and furniture)
- No fuel tanks, enclosed barrels or drums of any kind. Water heaters and propane tanks are OK

Please separate items into the following categories for recycling:

- Wood items: clean, unpainted lumber, pallets, etc.
- Metal items: scrap steel, appliances, lawn mowers, barbecues, plumbing, etc.
- Yard waste: limbs, grass, leaves, other vegetation, no stumps or limbs larger than 4" in diameter
- No dirt, rocks, sod, blackberries, scotch broom or other noxious weeds
- Tires: with or without rims
- Concrete, brick, and stone
- Car batteries
